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Victoria's gold rush transformed Melbourne, by the 1880s, into one of the world's biggest and richest cities. Melbourne had many fine buildings and one of the highest standards of living in the world. But, like industrial Britain, there was a flip side. Many families were desperately poor, living in makeshift dwellings and struggling to survive. Many young boys took to selling newspapers on street corners to help their families get by. In 1883, when posting a letter one evening, wealthy merchant and saddler William Forster came across three boys, who were barefoot, dirty and hungry. He took them home to spend the evening with his family, fed them, gave them new clothes and boots and, most significantly, talked to them about their future and ways of building a better one. He asked them to come back the following week – and to bring a friend. Eventually this led to the formation of the Melbourne Newsboys Club in 1893. The newsboys met weekly in central Melbourne and were connected with education, health and sporting services. It transformed their lives – and the destiny of generations that followed. (Many former newsboys still get together and talk fondly about their days at the club and the life-changing fork in the road.) In 1973, the club building and another property in Millgrove, east of Melbourne, were sold to establish the Newsboys Foundation, to ensure the work started by William Forster on that fateful night in 1883 continues for many more generations to come.

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It is with pleasure that we present our 117th Annual Report, for the year ended 30 June 2010.

The past 12 months has seen the Newsboys Foundation make its first Flagship Grant pursuant to the decision of the Board at its first strategic planning day conducted in March 2009. The recipient is the Mirabel Foundation, to enable it, in conjunction with Outward Bound, to conduct a Social Inclusion Program over three years for groups of disadvantaged young people aged between 12 and 17 years. Funding was granted for the first year and it was agreed in principle to support the project for the following two years subject to Newsboys having sufficient funds and the receipt of a satisfactory report on the program at the end of each year. It is pleasing that we have been able to make this commitment, particularly in circumstances where philanthropy generally is still suffering the effects of the global financial crisis.

It was with much sadness that we said farewell to our past President Ken Barry at the 17th December 2009 meeting of the Board, exactly 37 years to the day after his appointment to the Board. Ken had indicated in his Chairman's Report last year that he was relinquishing the reins as Chairman after three years in that role and eleven years as Vice President (as it was then known) before that. We are very grateful to Ken for the enormous help, assistance and leadership he has shown over his many years of involvement with Newsboys and wish him well for the future.

We welcome to the Board David Coombes, who was appointed at the June meeting of the Board. David is a very experienced solicitor, who specialises in taxation, and is a partner in the same firm as Ken Barry was, Norton Rose Australia (formerly Deacons). We are pleased to be able to continue the connection with Norton Rose Australia.

Despite the effects of the global financial crisis on our income, Newsboys was still able to make allocated grants of \$624,525 to 39 organizations. Since the Newsboys

Foundation was established in 1974, it has allocated total grants of just under \$11million.

Early in the calendar year, at the request of the Board, Sandy Shaw carried out a study of the grants Newsboys has made since 1 July 2003. In part this was prompted by a declining trend in the annual number of allocations: 82 in 2007, 65 in 2008, and 50 last year. It is significant and troubling that we discovered that many of the smaller club based organizations that previously applied for or received smaller sized grants are no longer in existence. In part this has come about through the need for, and the cost of, insurance. It was agreed Newsboys would continue to encourage and assist smaller organizations that meet our requirements and we recognize that such organizations provide a valuable role in delivering assistance to those less well off within the Victorian community.

Sadly, Newsboys lost one member, with the death of Valda Quick, in February. We also had two resignations and are glad to welcome one new member.

On behalf of the Board, my sincere thanks to our CEO, Sandy Shaw, her part-time Executive Assistant, Kerrie Bradburn, and Wendy Marris, who provides our accountancy services. It is a small but dedicated and very effective team - most capably led by Sandy - that carries out the day to day work of the organization. Without them the Board would not be able to carry out its function of providing assistance to the youth in Victoria.

In closing, we thank John Warner of E. L. & C. Baillieu Stockbroking Ltd for his continuing professional guidance, Grant Thornton for conducting our audit on a reduced fee basis and our honorary solicitors, Norton Rose Australia (formerly Deacons) for their legal services.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

"The more I know, the more I realize there's much more to learn." My grandfather, Walter Fenton, said this often throughout his long and extraordinary life. He was born in India in the 19th century, grew up in Leeds in the UK and migrated to Australia with his family. After fighting in France in WW1, he took up a soldier settlement block in the Mallee in Victoria's north west, cleared it by hand and established a successful farm.

Walter was an extraordinary role model. He had a thirst for knowledge, finding out new things. He never stopped learning. On top of this, he was a man of great integrity. He treated everyone he met with respect and humility and developed positive relationships based on communication and trust. In doing so, he moved with the times and stayed relevant.

Walter lived 101 years. He died in 1997, nearly 30 years after man landed on the moon. He witnessed a century of enormous change and discovery but never quenched his thirst, his desire, to know more.

In today's rapidly-changing world, I'm reminded of Walter and the way he lived his life. We must strive to stay abreast of emerging social issues, always be relevant, treat each other with respect and humility and develop relationships based on integrity, trust and effective communication. We must continue to learn.

In August 2009, I was privileged to travel to Europe and meet with philanthropic colleagues in London, including members of the John Lyon's Charity and the Community Network Foundation. I also travelled to Dublin and met with Atlantic Philanthropies, the One Foundation, Irish Youth Foundation, Social Entrepreneurs Ireland, Head Strong and the Belvedere Youth Club. It was a wonderful experience full of learning. Two central themes were reinforced:

- 1 Philanthropy can play a key role in identifying emerging social issues, conducting research and collaborating with others to address these issues in an innovative way. Integral to this is working with other stakeholders such as philanthropic organisations, community groups, government and business to ensure that successful programs are sustainable and can be scaled up and rolled out to reach even more people.
- 2 Philanthropy is much more than money. Philanthropy can value add by helping recipients build organisational capacity, and hone and make clear their vision and mission. It can also help recipients leverage other funds and strengthen financial sustainability.

It is vital that we, as an organisation, keep learning and implement the most effective philanthropic practices possible. I am pleased to report that the peer groups I continue to be involved with, including the CEO Peer Support Group (comprising the Jack Brockhoff Foundation, Ian Potter Foundation, R. E. Ross Trust and the Helen McPhearson Smith Trust), the Social Ventures Australia Learning Circle, Philanthropy Australia's Education Affinity Group and the Arts Affinity Group all provide an important and valuable platform for learning and collaboration. A pleasing outcome from the CEO Peer Support Group has been the establishment of a regular forum between the philanthropic sector and the Victorian State Government.



Our close involvement with grant applicants also informs us of the issues they face and helps us stay relevant and effective. Our Chairman, Zich Zichy-Woinarski Q.C, notes in his report that this year we are delighted to make a multiyear grant to the Mirabel Foundation for its Social Inclusion Program. This grant was made in response to an emerging social need. The program supports young people who have been orphaned or abandoned due to parental drug use and are in the care of their extended family. The Newsboys Foundation three-year grant will enable this new and important program to be firmly embedded in the Mirabel Foundation's suite of programs for young people. The Social Inclusion Program is profiled in detail in our Annual Report.

The Newsboys Foundation value adds by connecting grant recipients to our networks, helping them build capacity and sustainability. Similarly, our immediate past Chairman, Ken Barry, was committed to building the capacity and relevance of the Newsboys Foundation and made a significant contribution over many years. We were very sad to farewell Ken at our December 2009 Board meeting. I am pleased to report that Ken remains a member of the Newsboys Foundation.

We are delighted to have Zich Zichy-Woinarski Q.C. as our new Chairman. Zich is a passionate supporter of young people. He takes great delight in visiting grant recipients and learning more about the impact of our grants. Zich recently attended Blackwood Special Schools Outdoor Education Centre's 40th birthday celebrations, an inspiring day that reinforced the importance of the centre to many young people.

I sincerely thank Zich, Tricia Cox (Vice-Chairman), Deryk Stephens (Treasurer), Ken Barry (past Chairman) and John Warner (Chairman, Investment Committee) and all Board members for their outstanding support throughout the year. We are pleased to welcome David Coombes as a Director since June this year. David has already made a significant contribution to the Foundation.

My thanks also go to Kerrie Bradburn (part-time Executive Assistant) and Wendy Marris, who provides accountancy services. Kerrie and Wendy make a valuable contribution to the Foundation.

Finally, we salute the young people in our community who, in difficult circumstances, are striving to realise their potential, and the organisations and staff supporting them. You are an inspiration. It is a privilege to support you.

Grant making priorities

Education and training for young people who are disengaged from formal learning

The Newsboys Foundation supports initiatives that better respond to the diverse education needs of disadvantaged Victorian young people. Priority is given to initiatives that help disengaged young people attend school and take part in effective community-based education and training programs.

Creative arts initiatives for young people who are marginalised and experiencing disadvantage

The Newsboys Foundation funds arts initiatives for disadvantaged young people that help them become involved in positive community activities and, in doing so, re-engage with learning.

Personal development programs including sport and recreational activities and wilderness adventure camps

The Melbourne Newsboys Club provided some of Melbourne's first personal development programs for newsboys, including camping holidays to Millgrove. Since 1974, the Newsboys Foundation has continued this theme with a long history of funding personal development programs, including camps for disadvantaged young people. Such programs provide positive circuit breakers for young people to step out of negative and dysfunctional surrounds into positive, supporting, challenging and natural environments.

Mirabel will implement a comprehensive selection process to identify 15 young people to take part in a unique nine-day outdoor adventure camp. Outward Bound and Mirabel will work together to design each camp to meet the specific needs of participants. The camps will include bushwalking, caving and rock climbing as well as goal-setting workshops, counselling, feedback sessions and spontaneous group interactions. They will create a unique environment for personal growth.

Mirabel will provide two leaders to assist Outward Bound's two instructors during all aspects of the implementation of the program. These leaders will provide valuable insight into the background of these children and the difficulties they face. The expertise of the Outward Bound instructors will enable and ensure a safe and enjoyable wilderness experience for all participants. The young people get to take part in all aspects of the planning and implementation of the program and will be given opportunities to lead the group at various times during the camp. They will be encouraged to develop resourcefulness and determination while learning how to manage their time, communicate with others, self discipline, listen, work in a team, control and release their emotions, take the initiative and believe in oneself.

The camps are a course of self discovery. Mirabel will continue to work with the participants after the camps, enabling staff to form a close and trusted bond with each person and help them manage and deal with areas of difficulty identified during the course. Mirabel will also help each young person build a supportive network at school, develop positive relationships at home and establish a helpful peer network. A follow-up reunion camp at Mirabel House will be provided to offer participants the chance to reconnect with one another and reflect on their progress towards their goals. The combination of the Outward Bound course and Mirabel's post-course care is designed to give participants renewed direction and focus and the necessary skills to make a positive transition into adulthood.

The program will take place over three years to maximise benefits and results. This extensive timeframe cements this unique program as a permanent and essential component of the Mirabel calendar. The course is for young people from across Melbourne and regional Victoria. The camps will take place in the majestic and beautiful Snowy River National Park.

Principal Activities

The principal activity of the Foundation in the course of the year was the investment in stock exchange listed securities and interest bearing cash deposits the income from which was used mainly to provide financial assistance to community organisations working with disadvantaged young people and children in Victoria. No significant change in the nature of this activity has taken place during the year.

Review and Results of Operations

The net surplus/(deficit) for the financial year was \$214,648 (2009: (\$698,193)).

Investments have been revalued to fair value being the quoted market price at balance date. At 30 June 2010, a net revaluation increment of \$603,292 (2009: decrement of \$2,861,919) was taken to the Investment Revaluation Reserve.

In the opinion of the Board, operations of the Foundation for the year under review were at a satisfactory level.

State of Affairs

There have been no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Foundation during the year.

In the event the Foundation is to be wound up and there are insufficient funds, each member will be liable to contribute \$50 each. There are currently 65 members, totalling \$3,250.

Events Subsequent to Balance Date

There has not arisen in the interval between the end of the financial year and the date of this report any item, transaction or event of a material or unusual nature likely, in the opinion of the Board, to affect substantially the operations of the Foundation, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Foundation in subsequent financial years.

Likely Developments

The Board is confident that the Foundation will continue to maintain a satisfactory level of operations, realising sufficient income to continue a high level of allocations to community organisations working with disadvantaged young people and children in Victoria.

Dividends

The Foundation is precluded from declaring and paying dividends under its Constitution.

Environmental Issues

The operations of the Foundation are not subject to particular or significant environmental regulations under a Commonwealth, State or Territory Law.

Indemnifying Officers or Auditor

No indemnities have been given or insurance premiums paid, during or since the end of the financial year, for any person who is or has been an officer or auditor of the Foundation.

Proceedings on Behalf of the Foundation

No person has applied to the Court under section 237 of the Corporations Act 2001 for leave to bring proceedings on behalf of the Foundation, or to intervene in any proceedings to which the Foundation is a party, for the purpose of taking responsibility on behalf of the Foundation for all or any part of those proceedings.

No proceedings have been brought or intervened in on behalf of the Foundation with leave of the Court under section 237 of the Corporations Act 2001.

Related Party Transactions

Since the end of the previous financial year, no Director of the Board has received or become entitled to receive any benefit by reason of a contract made by the Foundation with the member, or a firm of which he/she is a member, or with a Company in which he/she has a substantial financial interest, save for Mr J R Warner who is a Representative of E.L. & C. Baillieu Stockbroking Ltd., which has received or become entitled to receive fees for professional services rendered.

The Board has authority for planning, directing and controlling the activities of the Foundation. Subject to the above, no Director of the Board has received any remuneration.

Newsboys Foundation (A Company Limited by Guarantee) Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended 30 June 2010

1. Significant accounting policies

Newsboys Foundation is a Company (limited by guarantee) domiciled in Australia. The financial report was authorised for issue by the Directors on 23 September 2010.

(a) Statement of compliance

The financial report is a general purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASBs) (including Australian Interpretations) adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the Corporations Act 2001. The financial report of the Foundation also complies with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and interpretations adopted by the International Accounting Standards Board.

(b) Basis of preparation

As stated above, the Foundation has adopted the above-mentioned accounting standards. However, those standards or amendments that were available for early adoption have not been adopted. The quantification of the potential impact of non-adoption of those standards and amendments is not known or reasonably estimable in the current financial year.

The financial report is prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historical cost, except for investments in listed securities which have been stated at fair value.

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. In particular, information about impairment of investments is a significant area of judgement as described in note 1(e).

There are no significant assumptions or sources of estimates that have a potential to cause a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets or liabilities in the next year.

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in the financial statements.

(c) Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Australian dollars which is the Foundation's functional currency.

(d) Financial assets

Investments in listed securities held by the Foundation are classified as being available-for-sale and are stated at fair value, with any resultant gain or loss being recognised directly in equity (investment revaluation reserve) – unless the reduction in fair value is judged to represent an impairment in which case the reduction is recognised in the income statement. When these investments are derecognised, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognised directly in equity is recognised in profit or loss.

The fair value of investments in listed securities classified as available-for-sale is their quoted bid price at the reporting date.

Available-for-sale investments are recognised / derecognised by the Foundation on the date it purchases / sells the investments.

(e) Impairment

Available for sale financial assets are assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any objective evidence that they are impaired. A financial asset is considered to be impaired if the fair value of the asset at period end had declined significantly below the assets original cost or if the asset had steadily declined over a prolonged period of time and the fair value at period end is lower than the assets original cost.

Any impairment losses are recognised in the income statement. Any cumulative loss in respect of available for sale financial assets recognised previously in equity is transferred to the income statement.

Any future reversals of impairment losses are recognised directly in equity through the reserve.

(f) Receivables

Receivables are stated at their amortised cost less impairment losses.

(g) Investment revenue

Interest revenue is recognised in the income statement as it accrues. Dividend and distribution revenue is recognised in the income statement on the date the Foundation's right to receive payments is established, which in the case of listed securities is the date the dividend is declared.

(h) Income tax

The Foundation, being a charitable institution, is exempt from income tax in accordance with Section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act.

(i) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances and call deposits.

Property, plant and equipment (i)

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised in the income statement on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment.

The estimated useful lives for the current and comparative periods are as follows:

Office Machines	5 years
Office Furniture	5 years

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date.

(k) Leases

Leases in which a significant portion of the risks and rewards of ownership are retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases. Payments made under operating leases (net of any incentives received from the lessor) are charged to the income statement on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

Employee benefits (1)

(i) Wages, salaries and annual leave

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including nonmonetary benefits and annual leave expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are recognised in provisions in respect of employees' services up to the reporting date and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid, inclusive of on costs, when the liabilities are settled. The expense for nonaccumulating sick leave is recognised when the leave is taken and measured at the rates paid or payable.

(ii) Long-term employee benefits

The liability for long service leave is recognised in the provision for employee benefits and measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service.

(m) Adoption of new and revised accounting standards

In the current year, the Foundation has adopted all of the new and revised Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board that are relevant to its operations and effective for the current annual reporting period.

The 2009 comparatives contained in these financial statements therefore differ from those published in the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2009 as described below.

Adoption of AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements (revisions), AASB 2007-8 and 2007-10 the Foundation has adopted the revisions to AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements in these financial statements which has resulted in the introduction of the statement of comprehensive income, changes to the statement of changes in equity, and other terminology changes.

- 1. Significant accounting policies
 - (a) Statement of compliance

The Melbourne Newsboys Club Trust was established as a Public Fund for charitable purposes to encourage the growth of the resources of the Fund by other donations and benefactions. Any donations to the Fund are tax deductible.
